The University of Northern British Columbia, in conjunction with the School of Education, seeks doctoral level candidates (completed doctorate given preference) in the fields of Masters Multidisciplinary Leadership and Bachelor of Education (K to 12) for a tenure-track Assistant Professor position with an anticipated start date of January 1, 2014 or July 1, 2014. The ideal candidate will have a record of teaching and leadership excellence in K-12 schools and/or teacher education or at least will be familiar with K-12 education teaching and leadership in British Columbia. The candidate will have, or be eligible for, registration with the Ministry of Education Teacher Regulation Branch. The candidate will show evidence of, or potential for research productivity. The successful candidate will teach in the M.Ed. Multidisciplinary Leadership specialization and also in the B.Ed. program. Academic preparation and experience in one or more areas of teacher candidate education is essential. A background in Diversity education at graduate and undergraduate levels is most desirable. Graduate course delivery will require some travel to regional locations and/or the delivery of online courses. The candidate must be willing to supervise multiple graduate students' research as well as contribute to program administration as assigned by the Chair of the School of Education. A high service load involving Collaboration with colleagues on a variety of activities within the School and the university is expected. Cross-cultural and northern including Aboriginal/Indigenous, sensitivities are essential.
